NASW CONFERENCE WORKSHOPS

A- Substance Use Screening, Brief Intervention and Referral for Non-substance Abuse Professionals

Presenter: Chris Brown, LCSW, ACSW, CSAC, ICADC, Program Specialist, Department of Health Alcohol & Drug Abuse Division

One quarter of clients in primary care settings misuse alcohol and other drugs. Ninety-five percent are in need of treatment but do not receive it. Social workers are in a key position to change this dynamic through a specific evidence-based practice that is acceptable, inexpensive, and effective. This workshop will involve learning and practicing the skills involved in screening and briefly intervening with alcohol and drug problems.

B- Increasing Organizational Capacity through Effective Engagement of Older Adults

Presenter: Jay C. Bloom, MA, President/CEO, Bloom Anew

Adults 50 and over are the fastest growing demographic in Hawaii. This age group will represent the most educated, healthiest and in many cases the most affluent older population we have had in human history and they will age in entirely different ways than previous generations in the way they will engage in future work, travel, lifelong learning and civic engagement.

Organizations that recognize the potential of attracting and that hope of utilizing this vital new resource will need to prepare their own organizations and managers in different ways as well.

This presentation will highlight some of the coming trends and characteristics of this age group and examples of techniques that individuals and organizations can use to leverage more effectively the interests and energies of older adults.

C- Ethical Issues and Dilemmas for Mental Health Professionals

Presenter: Steven Bucky, PhD, ABPP, Full Professor, Director of Professional Training, Executive Director Addictions Institute

This workshop focuses on advanced ethical practice for mental health practitioners, describing enforceable standards and aspirational principles for mental health professionals. The presentation emphasizes: (1) general principles that are relevant to all mental health professionals, (2) an ethical decision-making process when faced with the potential ethical, legal, clinical dilemmas; and (3) those specific ethical principles in which mental health professionals are most frequently accused within civil lawsuits, ethics and licensing board complaints.

D- Parenting, Domestic Violence and Incarceration

Presenter: Oliver Williams, Ph.D., Executive Director of the Institute on Domestic Violence in the African American Community, and a Professor in the School of Social Work at the University of Minnesota, in St. Paul. He is also the Director of the Safe Return Initiative.

Over the last several years the United States has had an increased discussion about prisoner reentry and domestic violence. Much of the discussion has focused on what helps formerly incarcerated persons to reintegrate into society. Many of these persons, particularly men, have left families that experience intimate partner violence at their hand. Also many return to community and the possibility of reconnecting with former or current partners and/or the children they share. This presentation will explore the good examples of programs that are encouraging positive fathering while at the same time describes the challenges as it relates to children and families when there has been a history of intimate partner violence.

E- Child Custody Evaluations: Is This a Good Area of Practice, and What is Needed to Do It

Presenter: Robert Geffner, PhD, ABPP, ABN, President, Institute on Violence, Abuse and Trauma at Alliant International University

Conducting child custody evaluations is a needed area of practice for social workers and other mental health professionals if they have the appropriate training, expertise, and abilities. This workshop discusses the main components and procedures utilized in child custody evaluations, the types of cases involved, the training needed, and the ethical issues that arise. The pros and cons of this income opportunity are presented as well.

F- Who's Looking After You?

Presenter: Stephen McCall, Health Educator

This workshop will teach you to smile/laugh/sing your way to better health by finding aerobic health and using the USDA Food Guide Pyramid 2010.

G- Family Advocacy Social Work Supporting the Deployment Cycle

Presenters: Col. Derrick Arincorayan, PhD, BCD, LCSW and Rachelle Salerno, LCSW

Since the Global War on Terrorism began, the Army has adapted a balanced defense strategy. Social Workers are important in supporting troops as they move through the deployment cycle. Family Advocacy Program (FAP) social workers support the deployment cycle by mitigating risk of spousal and child abuse among soldiers and their families. Treatment is multidisciplinary and includes key leadership and coordination with Brigade Combat Teams (BCT) down range which also have assigned behavioral health providers (BCT). With the increasing need for social work support in the military, mitigating compassion fatigue is also essential.

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I- Adapting and Replicating Evidence-Based Health

Presenter: Dr. Kathryn Braun, DrPH, Professor, University of Hawaii

What is evidence-based programming? How do you choose an evidence-based program that fits your seniors? How can you assure fidelity of implementation? How do you evaluate it without over-burdening participants and service providers? In this session, members of Hawai'i's Healthy Aging Partnership will discuss lessons learned from efforts to replicate the EnhanceFitness and Chronic Disease Self Management programs.

J- Ethically and Practically Speaking: Managing Your Risk

Presenter: ASI trustee

This workshop will cover key concepts in risk management, such as confidentiality and its exceptions, duty to warn, and informed consent. The seminar will discuss the major reasons why social workers are sued and what can be done to reduce those risks. A presentation on what constitutes a malpractice case, recordkeeping issues, guidelines for supervision, special tips for clinical and private practitioners, and special features of malpractice insurance will be emphasized.

K- Restorative Justice With a Solution-Focused Approach for Disenfranchised People

Presenter: Lorenn Walker

This workshop will engage participants who will learn about Hawai'i's restorative applications, using a solution-focused approach, for a variety of people including homeless and foster youth, domestic violence parties in courts and for reentry of incarcerated people and their loved ones. Unique programs have been developed, provided and evaluated in Hawai'i over the last 10 years. Former participants of several programs will share their experiences at the workshop. A mock restorative intervention will be provided during the workshop.

L- Adoption Home Studies and Other Custody Studies in Hawaii

Presenter: Trina Yamada, JD, LSW

This workshop will focus on conducting home studies and other types of custody studies in Hawaii touching on Hawaii's unique family make-up and cultural differences. This will be a hands on workshop with case studies and audience participation.

M- Maintain Your Brain

Presenter: Ira Kazama MSW, Oahu Program Coordinator, Alzheimer's Association

Find out what you can do to keep your brain healthy and help reduce the risk of getting Alzheimer's disease. Attend the Alzheimer's Association's *Maintain Your Brain®: how to live a brain healthy lifestyle* community workshop. The one-hour interactive workshop features nutritional and lifestyle advice, strategies to keep your memory sharp, interactive exercises and activities, and materials to take home for further reading.

N- Social Work Services for Hawaii's Active Duty Service Members, Veterans, and their Families: A Panel Discussion

Presenters: Col. Derrick Arincorayan, PhD, LCSW, Kalani Mills, LCSW, Victor Voth, LCSW, DCSW, Debra O'Brien, LCSW. Moderator: Jim Bibbee, MSW

This panel will explore current issues affecting social work practice with military service members, veterans and their families. Such issues include deployment cycles, contemporary military culture, approaches to prevention, detection and treatment of behavioral health problems.

O- Tatoo or Taboo, Self-Expression or Self-Abuse?

Presenter: Bernice Strand, MSW, Program Director, Hawai'i Access to Recovery (ATR)

A VERY provocative workshop that discusses the continuum of self-harming behaviors, including substance abuse that may be the subject of clinical intervention. Related content from feminist theory and faith perspectives challenge the clinician to evaluate the

client's behavior using micro, mezzo, and macro perspectives rather than patently endorsing or denouncing self-mutilating behaviors.

P- Ha Kupuna, National Resource Center for Native Hawaiian Elders

Presenter: Dr. Noreen Mokuau, DSW, and Dr. Colette Browne, DrPH, MSW, Professors at the University of Hawai'i Myron B. Thompson School of Social Work

This session will describe Ha Kupuna, National Resource Center for Native Hawaiian Elders, one of three federally funded resource centers for native elders. We will describe the community-engaged methods used to develop the center and present a conceptual framework for practice with Native Hawaiian older adults.

R- School –Based Services for Children Exposed to Domestic Violence

Presenter: Su Atta, BA, Program Supervisor, and Kata Issari, MSW, Program Director, Parents and Children Together Family Peace Center

This presentation will provide participants with an overview of clinical and research findings related to how children are impacted by exposure to domestic violence. Specific organizational and clinical aspects of an ongoing intervention program in Oahu schools will then be presented. Strengths and limitations of approaches will be discussed in the context of research, clinical practice, advocacy and the need for coordinated systems of care. Participant questions and involvement will be solicited throughout the presentation.
